We can see the hurt, the embarrassment, and the relief that someone can actually help. When they tell us what's happening in their lives, we can almost see the burden being lifted. Some folks call to see if we might be able to help them through their emergency. Their voices let us hear their desperation. Often they've called other places and have had no answers, no returned calls, and no help.

Just before school started, a woman came into the pantry looking for food. As she was filling out the intake card her hands were shaking. I went over to see if there was anything I could do to help. When she looked at me I could see the black eye hiding behind the makeup. "My finances have drastically changed. I haven't needed help before, but please, could I get some food for the kids?" I started talking to her about Sammy's Shoes...she broke into tears. School was starting and the kids didn't have shoes. "Life has been hard," she said. "I didn't want to come in." My heart broke thinking about someone hurting this sweet woman. I told her how glad I was that she came in, she

said she was so glad too. We hugged and prayed. I continue to pray for her.

We are forever changed by the men, the women, the senior citizens, and especially the kids we meet at the Good Samaritan. We take them with us as we journey through our days and nights. I ask God to remember all the folks that I have offered to pray for, He remembers names a lot better than I do!

Looking at our nearly 370 guests made me think about what it would be like to have all of our active clients together in one room. What an impact! If we think about the families of those clients, that number could be multiplied by three or more times! That is a lot to ponder! God's faithfulness is evident!

Moms & Tots has been serving the moms and their families in our community for 15 years! Please join me in thinking about some of the ways that God's love has been shared through the years.

- Our first year we had 105 client visits. Our current number is 1005.
- The first year we had 10 volunteers. We now have over 30. This past year our volunteers logged 1849 hours.
- 1748 children were served by the Moms & Tots Center this past year.
- Our current Director and the 2 past Directors have shared their heart for the ministry and have been used by God to love His people.
- We outgrew one building, are filling our current building and are in the process of adding a new wing/building.
- His House Ministry has been added, ministering to the dads and men in our community.
- Our educational programing has grown. We now have 15 clients participating in our Earn While You Learn program each month.
- Willing to Wait abstinence program was in 5 schools and had audience with over 200 students last year. We are looking to grow that number in this current school year.



Looking forward, we are committed to love moms and their children. We continue to value all life at every stage. We provide hope and encouragement in a world that can be hard to handle. All of this happens because we have a God who loves His people. May God continue to use those of us working and supporting the Moms & Tots Center in the coming years. May we share God's love and truth to the people He chooses to send our way. This too makes me stand in awe.

Our current director, Gayle Kroon, shared her heart as she updated guests on the past year, how Moms & Tots builds bridges for our families and how the clients we serve feel about the ministry at the Center.

The emcee, Stan Moore, then introduced Ryan Dobson, guest speaker for the evening. Ryan spoke about his experiences as a son,

a husband, and a father. By using his life experiences he related the importance of having someone to walk through those events with you. A young girl does not grow up saying, "I can't wait to use the services of Moms & Tots." Sometimes it just happens. Our clients

come to the Center for this type of support which is important to them and to our communities.

The evening ended with a video of some of our clients sharing their stories and their expressions of thankfulness for the services Moms & Tots provides them. We asked people to join us by financially giving to this continued work and give they did. What a tremendous out-pouring of love and support! Our hope was to receive \$57,000 over the banquet expenses, which is a little over half of our operating budget for the year. Some donations

are still arriving and it appears that we will reach that goal. Thank you to all who attended and for the prayers of many to make this evening possible.

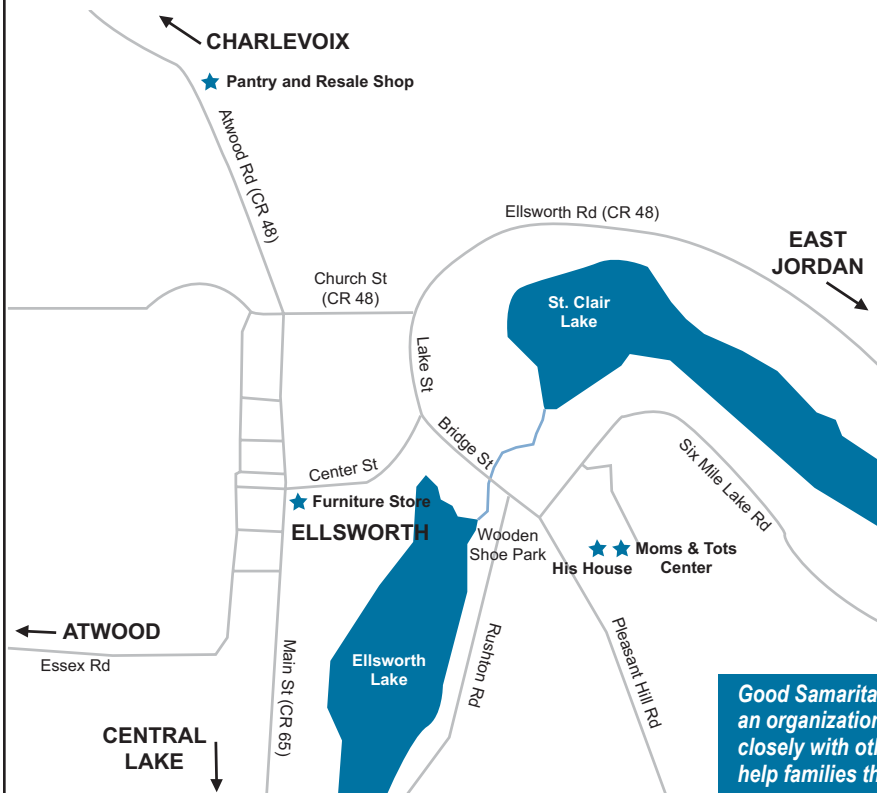

Good Samaritan Pantry and Resale Shop sells gently used clothing and other items at low prices. These sales help pay for Pantry food for more than 700 clients. Good Sam helps with utility and heating bills as our finances permit. Located at 9746 Main Street, Ellsworth. Open Tuesday 10 to 7, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday from 10 to 4, and Saturday from 10 to 2.

Moms & Tots Center was established in 2001 to serve the needs of young pregnant women, single mothers and their babies. Services include pregnancy tests, peer counseling, a baby closet for supplies and equipment, and an earn while you learn program. The Center has more than 400 active clients. Located at 9100 Pleasant Hill Road, Ellsworth. Open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 10 to 4.

His House serves the needs of young fathers who desire to become great dads. Located in the lower level of the Moms & Tots Center. Open Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 10 to 4.
